#### **NEED GRADWEEK ON-SITE ASSISTANCE?**

Do not hesitate to reach out to GradWeek Staff, we are here to help! If you have an issue or a situation during your trip, you must contact on-site staff so we can assist you while at the destination. Do not hesitate to call or text (via WhatsApp). If you cannot contact us yourself, have a friend call or text. GradWeek staff are available to help you on-site 24/7. We have staff housed at every student hotel and staff are present at all GradWeek sponsored events.

#### **NEED TO CALL HOME?**

Upon arriving we strongly encourage that you take a minute and call home. We often get calls from parents saying they have not heard from their son or daughter. To avoid unnecessary calls and worrying, take few minutes and call or message your parent(s) to let them know you made it to the Cabo San Lucas safely. The easiest way to call home is to use the pay phones in the lobby. This will help you avoid costly hotel surcharges the hotel will charge when you call from your room. The time zone in Cabo is GMT. \*Calling the U.S. from another country can be expensive and we recommend that you keep your call brief to avoid large phone charges. Simply dial the number listed on the pay-phone and a U.S. operator will place a collect call. \*Please Note: If you are using your cell phone to call home, typical rates are \$3.50 per minute, so keep calls brief! In addition, those with Data Plans, you can incur enormous cell phone bills by leaving your Data Connection on while in the Bahamas to avoid this we recommend keeping your phone in airplane mode.

#### **NEED MEDICAL ATTENTION?**

GradWeek staff members are not doctors and thus will not make any judgment calls on whether or not medical attention is necessary for any reason. This decision is entirely up to the traveler and his or her parents. If you are in doubt as to whether medical attention is needed, we strongly recommend you contact your parent(s) and/or guardian(s) and ask for advice. If you are in need of medical attention and it is a non-emergency, you can locate a GradWeek Staff member for directions to the nearest medical facility. If you cannot find a GradWeek Staff member, simply go to your hotel's front desk for assistance or call the number above. If it is an emergency, dial 911 (also used in Mexico) and have your friend notify a GradWeek Staff Member. If you need medical care, you will be required to pay for any hospital services upfront, you must keep all of your medical receipts and file a claim with the insurance company upon your return home for reimbursement.

#### **HELPFUL SAFETY & TRAVEL TIPS**

- Tourist Card On your flight into Mexico, you are required to complete a Tourist
  Card and present it to a Mexican immigration official (digitally or physically—your
  airline will advise you for your specific flight). The official will return a portion of
  the card to you. DO NOT LOSE THIS CARD! Store it in a safe place along with your
  passport. You will be required to present it before leaving the country.
  Replacement cards can cost \$60.00 USD or more and may delay your departure.
- The Laws of Mexico / Drugs and Alcohol In general, many laws that apply in the United States also apply in Mexico. UNDERAGE DRINKING, DRUG POSSESSION, AND USE ARE ILLEGAL. Just say NO! Under any circumstances, do not buy, sell, or use drugs. If you do, you may be removed from your hotel and could end up in jail—age. your own expense. In Mexico, you will be tried as an adult regardless of your age. Unlike in the U.S., the legal system in Mexico considers you "guilty until proven innocent." Use common sense, respect others, and you should have no issues. "Please Note: Tourists often end up in jail for the following reasons: using, possessing, buying, or selling drugs; underage drinking; fighting; urinating in public; vandalism; theft; and climbing hotel balconies. Harassing or taunting law enforcement officers will result in arrest. Additionally, do not walk on the beach or swim in the ocean at night. GradWeek travelers may be required to present identification to enter certain nightclubs and restaurants.
- Hydration DRINK PLENTY OF WATER!! After many hours of travel, combined with laying in the sun and lack of sleep, it's critical that you stay

hydrated. Be sure to drink lots of water during your trip. You'll feel better, be less susceptible to illness, and you will have an overall better experience!

- The Buddy System We highly recommend the buddy system. Please stay out in groups, especially when going back to your hotel at night. Always remember that there is safety in numbers! If you leave the hotel or an event, also tell a friend where you are going and when you plan to return.
- Taxis Getting around is typically done by Taxi (Uber and Lyft is unauthorized to operate in Mexico) so plan to have cash on hand for this. Traveling in groups is the safest and most economical way to go. The taxis run all day and night. They will cost anywhere from \$5-\$45 per person depending on where you want to go. You can take up to 4 people in a standard taxicab. We strongly recommend that no one rides alone, especially at night!
- Cabo Public Transit System Buses operate 24 hours a day during the summer months.
   The bus route covers the entire length of the Hotel Zone and costs only 20-40 pesos per person. The public buses are the easiest and least expensive way to get where you need to go in Cabo. However, it should be noted that you can walk anywhere in the downtown area as it's all in close proximity to most hotels.
- Money The current currency exchange rate in Mexico is about 19 Pesos to 1 U.S. dollar.
   However, exchange rates change daily. If you're looking for the best rate, you will want to
   exchange your money at one of the exchange booths located throughout downtown
   Cabo. If you're looking for convenience, most hotels will exchange money at the front
   desk.
- Hotel/Room Damage You and your roommates are all responsible for paying for any and all damage to your room. This also includes any extensive cleaning due to stains, smoking, liquid spills etc. Take care of your room! Upon arriving to your room make sure you and your roommates take 5 minutes to check your room and report any damage to the room if any so that you are not charged for it when you check out. Please walk down to the Front Desk and report any damages immediately. Do not let strangers into your room. Keep your doors locked at all times, including any balcony sliding doors.
- Hotel Safe Deposit Box We strongly recommend that you put all of your
  valuables in your safe deposit box upon check-in. THIS INCLUDES CELL PHONES,
  GO PROS, MONEY, ETC.!!! If a box is not provided to you in your room, you can get
  one at the front desk. \*Report any missing/stolen items IMMEDIATELY to the
  HOTEL! DO NOT leave your valuables out when you are not in the room; aways put
  them away!
- Checkout/Departure Home Airport buses leave on-time so don't be late or you can get left behind! The night before departure, travelers will need to pack their bags and MUST clean their rooms, take out all trash (very important); garbage bags are available from GradWeek Staff or the hotel front desk and tidy up room. On the day of your departure, proceed to the Front Desk to settle any incidental balances on your room. You must be in the lobby 3 hours prior to your scheduled flight departure time. \*Buses will leave without you!! If your flight is not until late afternoon or evening, hotel checkout is at 11:00AM and you can check your bags at the bell desk. We suggest some last-minute shopping.
- Motorized Water Sports and Mopeds We strongly recommend not renting jet skis,
  mopeds, or other motorized water sports equipment. These items are locally owned, and
  you are fully responsible for any damages that occur. Moped accidents are common, and
  many students have been charged for damage they may not have caused. Always inspect
  any equipment thoroughly before use and report any existing damage. For your safety
  and to avoid unexpected charges, we advise against renting mopeds or similar vehicles
  during your stay.
- Ocean Safety The ocean in Cabo has a strong undertow and can be very dangerous.
   During the day, check to see if your hotel has posted warning flags on the beach. Most hotels use these flags to indicate current ocean conditions. DO NOT enter the ocean at night, regardless of the flag status—it is extremely dangerous after dark.
- Balconies Do not sit on the ledge of your balcony or try and jump balconies from one room to another. Do not sit anything on the railing, it is very easy to fall off your balconies and can cause life threatening injuries!
- Crossing the Street While it may seem simple, crossing the street is one of the most
  dangerous activities in Cabo. Always look both ways and take it seriously. Cars and
  buses often drive at high speeds and do not yield to pedestrians. Unlike in the U.S.,
  pedestrians do not have the right of way in Mexico. Use extreme caution and only cross
  at designated crosswalks.
- Money Wire Services If you need more funds, you can request a wire transfer through GradWeek. Simply ask your parent or guardian to complete a <u>Wire Transfer Form</u>, available on the <u>RESOURCES</u> page at <u>www.gradweek.com</u>. GradWeek will charge their credit card for up to \$300, and you will receive the funds on-site. To collect your money, be sure to have your photo ID and speak with a GradWeek staff member. Wire transfers are distributed Monday through Friday at 7:00 PM (Cabo time) at the GradWeek 24-hour room.

• Getting Around Cabo: Getting around is typically done by Taxi (Uber and Lyft is unauthorized to operate in Mexico) so plan to have cash on hand for this.
